Writing Dialogue

- 1. Use quotation marks to show a character's exact words. "Where is the dog?" asked Jacob.
- 2. Use a comma, and exclamation point, or a question mark at the end of a character's statement. Notice that the punctuation is inside the quotation marks. Also notice that there is a period after the speech tag.
 "I will look for the dog," Jacob stated.
 "Let's look for him!" exclaimed Carl.
 "Where do you think he went?" asked Nick.
- 3. Begin the character's statement or question with a capital letter. "The dog ran away," said Nick.
- 4. If the character's statement is divided, use a lower case letter to start the second part of the quotation."The dog dashed out the door," explained Nick, "and he raced across the yard."
- 5. If the character makes two or more statements (complete thoughts), use a capital letter to begin each sentence."I don't want him to get hurt," said Jacob. "Let's go find him."
- 6. Change lines every time the speaker changes."How can we find him?" asked Jacob."Let's put up posters around the neighborhood," suggested Nick, "and then we can drive around looking for him."
