 A quote is any word, sentence, or passage taken from a text. The words can be but are not necessarily spoken. Whatever appears between quotation marks should be <i>exactly</i> what the text/person says. 	 It is meaningful to you, the author, or the characters It is about something important: an event, person, or idea. You know you can write about it.
